Belgium	The labour market situation shall not be taken into account for spouse and children during the period of validity of the Blue Card. The potential employer of family member does, however, have to apply for work permit "B" and work authorization from the competent regional authority.	Spouse and minor children, including adopted and custodial children, a legally registered partner and adult single children who are disabled.	Once the family member has the work permit "B", (granted without a labour market test), he/she can start working for the specified employer only. The B permit has to be renewed after (max.) one year. Regional authorities issue work permits and Federal Public Service Employment regulates alien workers. 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Germany	Spouse will automatically be granted a residence permit entitling him or her to take up any kind of employment.	Spouse and minor children when legally married and spouse has min. age of 18. Children under 16 years may be granted residence permit as well as young people between the ages of 16 and 18 in cases of hardship or if their prospects of integration are good. Where a parent with sole custody of a child under 16 immigrates to Germany, the child is entitled to a residence permit. Same sex registered partners are eligible in practice, but this is not provided for in law. Italy	Permitted to work without conditions and to be self-employed. Need to prove that they have lived together in the same state of origin and available housing meets minimum required by law as well as annual income from legitimate sources not less than amount of annual social assistance if asking for reunification of one family member, double for two or three family members and triple for four or more family members. The residence permit should be granted within 90 days from application. Spouse and minor children including adopted and custodial children.	<p>If family members <u>other than spouse</u> want to take employment they need to follow the normal work permit procedure.</p> <p>The vacancy should be registered in the State Employment Agency and available for EU citizens for at least one month. If it cannot be filled by an EU citizen, an employer should confirm an invitation to a third-country national and, if proven that this person has all necessary qualifications, a work permit will be issued and a new residence permit, stating that holder has right to employment with a particular employer.</p>	No web link available.

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Slovakia	Authorized to work and perform business activities. Sweden	The Blue Card Directive has not been transposed in Sweden yet. The intention is that family members will be granted a residence permit as well as a work permit with no time limit in respect of access to the labour market. This table gives an overview of the family work authorization under the Blue Card regulations adopted by EU Member States in their national legislation as a result of the EU Blue Card Directive, 2009. <http://eur-lex.europa.eu/LexUriServ/LexUriServ.do?uri=CELEX:32009L0050:EN:NOT>. Three Member States (Denmark, Ireland and the UK) opted out of the Directive and therefore do not issue Blue Cards. They are included in the overview for completeness and because they have their own regulations on family member work authorization.

Several EU Member States (e.g. France, Italy, the Netherlands et al.) have additional work permit arrangements, other than the Blue Card, which also have provisions for family members to work. At the present time, these have not been included in this table.
